

Citing from online databases

In the research for your paper you will likely use essays and journal articles collected from online databases. Note that the citation formats offered on these databases does not conform to the standard format used for writing history papers, which is outlined in Kate Turabian, *A Manual For Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations*. This is the standard style manual for use in history courses. You can find a good guide to Turabian form on Bedford/St. Martin's website "Research and Documentation Online" <http://www.dianahacker.com/resdoc/p04_c10_s1.html>. Pay attention to small matters of punctuation. Mastering proper citation forms is not difficult, but does require attending to detail.

Jstor

A citation on Jstor appears like this:

Shutting the Gates of Mercy: The American Origins of Total War, 1860-1880
Lance Janda
The Journal of Military History, Vol. 59, No. 1. (Jan., 1995), pp. 7-26.

The correct note form should appear like this:

Lance Janda, "Shutting the Gates of Mercy: The American Origins of Total War, 1860-1880," *Journal of Military History* 59, no. 1 (January 1995), 7-26.

The correct bibliographic form should appear like this:

Janda, Lance. "Shutting the Gates of Mercy: The American Origins of Total War, 1860-1880." *Journal of Military History* 59, no. 1 (January 1995): 7-26.

Project Muse

A citation on Project Muse looks like this:

Wetta, Frank Joseph 1942-
"Now a Major Motion Picture": War Films and Hollywood's New Patriotism [View in PDF]
The Journal of Military History - Volume 67, Number 3, July 2003, pp. 861-882 - Article

The correct note form should appear like this:

Frank Joseph Wetta, "'Now a Major Motion Picture': War Films and Hollywood's New Patriotism," *Journal of Military History* 67, no. 3 (July 2003), 861-82.

The correct bibliographic form should appear like this:

Wetta, Frank Joseph. "'Now a Major Motion Picture': War Films and Hollywood's New Patriotism. *Journal of Military History* 67, no. 3 (July 2003): 861-82.

Expanded Academic Index/Academic Search Premier

A citation on EAI/ASP looks like this:

Improvised Destruction: Arnold, LeMay, and the Firebombing of Japan. By: Ralph, William W.. *War in History*, Nov2006,
